## **SMOKE ALARMS:** KITCHEN: ☐ Place all flammable items, like dishtowels, wooden ☐ Install a smoke alarm on every level of your home, including your basement. Be sure to place them near spoons, cookbooks and packaging materials, away sleeping areas, and inside each bedroom. from the stove. Test your smoke alarms once a month, and make sure Have a working fire extinguisher in the kitchen, and your child can recognize the sound. know how to use it. ☐ Check the expiration dates on all alarms. Replace those ☐ If you can, keep children out of the kitchen while that are more than 10 years old. you're cooking. If that's not possible, create a clear zone of 3 feet around the stove. FIRE ESCAPE PLANNING: FIREPLACES AND SPACE HEATERS: ☐ Prepare a fire escape plan, and make sure your family knows what to do and where to meet in case ☐ Place a sturdy screen in front of all fireplaces; install of an emergency. barriers around space heaters. ☐ Place escape ladders near each window above the ☐ If you have a fireplace, use seasoned hardwood, such first floor. as oak, ash or maple, and be sure to have your fireplace inspected and cleaned once a year. Teach your child to get low and crawl on the ground, where the air is less smoky. Show your child how to use the back of his hand to check doorknobs and doors for heat before opening. Teach them to use a different way out if the door is hot to the touch. Teach children to let firefighters and adults know where they are by answering their calls. Even if they are scared, they should never hide.

	Place flashlights in easy-to-locate areas of the home.	there are not too many appliance cords in one outlet.
	Remove all novelty lighters, or any lighters that look like toys.	Use ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) in all outlets, especially in areas where water is used.
	Store matches, lighters and other flammable materials in a safe place, or high up out of children's reach and sight. Teach them to never play with these things.	Use a surge protector on outlets. Make sure to use only one surge protector per wall outlet.  Cover all unused outlets with outlet covers.
	Store gasoline only in approved containers, and keep them in a locked location, like a garage or shed.
